All Stars were in unstoppable form and picking up some nicely-executed scores against the Clifden zone defence, they had the match sewn up at half time when they led 43-18.

They abandoned all caution in the second period as they went for the clusive 100-mark and they were a long way off (85-44) when the last three minutes was called.

But in a burst of power which has become a feature of their game, Sligo switched on the overdrive and brought the house down with some great scores in the final minute.

Brian O'Hara had the honour of putting 100 on the scoreboard—a fitting reward for this much-improved player—but another fine performer was Robert Burns who popped up from nowhere for many of his scores.

Anthony Cronnelly had a giantsize job in holding the forceful Matt O'Sui'ivan, while Joe Palmer was only slightly hampered by an ankle injury which had threatened to keep him out of the gamer

Jerry Monaghan. Cormac Carty and Brian McHugh showed their paces for the limited time they had on court and were always on call.

This victory leaves Slige in a comfortable position near the head of the table and at this stage, it appears that the vital games will be the home fixtures against Corintbians and Austin Stacks in the coming months.
